The Romance Hero Characteristics

(medieval descendant of the epic hero)

- Usually born under mysterious circumstances
- Grows up in obscurity
- Undergoes a childhood initiation involving a magic weapon
- In maturity, fights to defeat evil and promote peace
- Aided by magic weapons and wise mentors
- Mysterious events surround his departure from this world (suggesting that he may return when his people need him the most)

The Romance Motif Characteristics

(Archetypes)

- A near-perfect hero
- An evil enemy
- A three-stage quest (dangerous journey, a test or ordeal, and a return to where the journey began—to tell the truth of his adventures/trials)
- Female figures: young maidens in need of rescue, old crones, or mothers
- Magic/supernatural aspects
- Number 3 (symbolic)
- Good vs. Evil theme
- Usually teaches a moral lesson
- Faithful follower
- Wise old man
- Dreams
- Betrayal

Qualities/Traits of a "Good Knight"

(fr. Center for Learning)

- Does not battle to attain wealth
- Does good for the sake of good
- Generous with his personal possessions (belongings)
- Corrects wrongs
- Battles only for a just cause
- Keeps his word
- Protects the less fortunate
- Respects & serves women
- Merciful
- Credits God with his good fortune

Qualities/Traits of a "Good Knight"

fr. Le Morte d'Arthur by Sir Thomas Malory

- TO never do outrage nor murder
- TO always flee treason
- TO by no means be cruel but to give mercy unto him who asks for mercy
- TO always do ladies, gentlewomen, and widows succor
- TO never force ladies, gentlewomen, or widows
- TO NOT take up battles in wrongful quarrels for love or worldly goods

Qualities/Traits of a "Good Knight"

fr. De Casibus Virorum Illustrium by Giovanni Boccaccio

- TO never lay down arms
- TO seek after wonders
- TO defend the rights of the weak with all one's strength when called upon
- TO injure no one
- TO NOT attack one another
- TO fight for the safety of one's country
- TO give one's life for one's country
- TO seek nothing before honour
- TO NEVER break faith for any reason
- TO practice religion most diligently
- TO grant hospitality to anyone, each according to his ability
- Whether in honour or disgrace, TO make a report with the greatest fidelity to those who keep the annals
